TOM ADAMEC APPOINTED TO CITY COUNCIL

At the April 23 Council meeting, City Council formally appointed Tom Adamec to the vacant At Large position on City Council.

This vacancy was created due to the resignation of former At Large Councilman Henry Stacey. The Charter stipulates that Council vacancies be filled by a majority vote of the remaining members of Council. Council members utilized a good portion of Saturday, April 4, interviewing all 13 Blue Ash residents who applied for this vacant Council position. Candidates were evaluated on criteria such as history of leadership or service to our city or region, including service on Blue Ash boards or commissions or service with the schools, civic organizations, or homeowner associations, etc.; evidence of engagement

and "roots" in the community; education and work background; diversity; and demonstrated leadership and teamwork ability. Mr. Adamec excelled in all areas of evaluation and was Council's unanimous choice.

RESIDENTIAL TREE PROGRAM

Blue Ash City Council authorized continued funding in 2009 for the residential tree program which provides assistance to property owners for planting of trees in publicly visible locations on residential properties. Residents have taken advantage of the program to plant hundreds of trees throughout our community. Below are the "basics" of the Program. Visit the tree program portion of BlueAsh.com (under "municipal services") for many more details, or call the Reception Desk during office hours at 745-8500 (ext. 0) with questions....

► This program offers Blue Ash homeowners a discount coupon towards the cost of trees purchased for planting in publicly visible locations (usually front or side yards).

► To receive this discount, you must first get a coupon from the City and purchase your tree through a participating nursery. To order your coupon, call 745-8500 (then dial zero) weekdays between 8AM and 5PM. You will receive your discount at the time of purchase when you present the coupon to the nursery.

► The intention of the program is to allow the planting of up to two trees per residence; however, you may qualify to purchase more trees if you have experienced loss of tree(s) due to recent natural occurrences affecting our region (such as the extreme drought in 2007, ice or windstorm damage, etc.).

► The coupon allows a discount of up to 50% off the cost of each tree, including planting by the nursery, up to a max discount of \$150 per tree.

► All you need to do is order and get your coupon, visit one of the nurseries listed, pick out an appropriate tree for its intended location, present your coupon upon payment, and work with the nursery to schedule its planting.

► It is the resident's responsibility to provide proper care for the tree, following nursery guidelines. Any problems must be resolved between the resident and nursery.



NEW POLICE MOTORCYCLE NOW IN SERVICE!

You might have seen it in recent days ... Blue Ash's first official Police motorcycle was put into service in early May!

A major benefit for having a Police motorcycle is to put a Blue Ash Officer in closer contact with citizens by providing a more approachable means of transportation. Patrol Officer Mike Bray, as one of the City's Neighborhood Liaison Officers, was selected to be Blue Ash's motorcycle Patrol Officer and had to complete 80 hours of extensive training in Nashville, Tennessee before his debut.

The motorcycle is a 2009 Harley Davidson Police Electra Glide, and it was purchased and equipped entirely from seizure monies – not from the City's budget. Training fees were also paid for utilizing the seizure monies. The motorcycle will be used throughout the year, except for the most severe inclement weather

conditions. Officer Bray will be able to do anything on the Police motorcycle that a regular Patrol Officer/cruiser can do, except for transport of prisoners. The Department and City are also excited about the fact that the motorcycle gets about 41 miles per gallon!

The next time you see Officer Bray patrolling your neighborhood, feel free to stop and talk with him and to see close-up the City's newest crime enforcement vehicle!

RECYCLING

Your City has teamed up with Rumpke Recycling to offer residents larger (65-gallon) recycling carts! These green carts can hold four times more material than the traditional red recycling bins, and will be offered no charge to residents. Carts come equipped with wheels to help residents transport recyclable materials to the curb and a lid to help keep rainwater and animals out, and the recyclables in! And more good recycling news, Blue Ash – Congrats! Blue Ash continues to be among the best recyclers in the Cincinnati area! Our residential recycling rate has passed the 25% mark, and we are continuing to divert huge amounts of trash from the landfill. These recycled materials can be remanufactured into new, useful products. If you live in a single-family area of Blue Ash, are a new Blue Ash resident, or do not have a curbside recycle container, contact the City at 745-8538 to get your bin, or the new larger cart described above. There is no cost to residents for the bin, cart, or the weekly pickup by Rumpke. Blue Ash residents recycle because it's the right thing to do.

The City has been installing special green containers for recycling cans and bottles (both plastic and glass) throughout downtown, in the Nature Park, at the Recreation Center and pool, and at various other locations throughout the City. These containers are made from recycled plastics and will be easily identified to give citizens a convenient way to recycle drink containers. Aluminum cans and plastic bottles are two of the easi-

est materials to recycle into new products and save a tremendous amount of natural resources. These special containers are funded by a Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District grant in their continuing efforts to help communities reduce the amount of trash going to the landfills. Please start using these new containers!

Computer and Television Recycling

Did you know that the Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District sponsors a program for recycling computers and televisions? The goal of the program is to keep these used electronics out of the landfills by offering convenient recycling services for Hamilton County residents. DISPOSAL OF BULK ITEMS & HAZARDOUS WASTES

Don't forget that Blue Ash provides a drop-off location for residents at our Service Garage (6131 Interstate Circle) for large items and certain hazardous wastes. Items which may be disposed of include large or small amounts of unbundled brush; trash items (i.e., furniture, bedding, wood, lumber, appliances); hazardous materials (oil, gas, paint, batteries, mercury, lawn pesticides, tires, etc.); and broken concrete, dirt, rocks, topsoil, and debris. These dumpsters at the Service Garage are extremely handy, especially if disposal is desired on a day other

than regular garbage pickup, or if the item would not be accepted by the waste contractor. These dumpsters are for residents ONLY and may not be used by contractors or non-residents. Proof of residency is required by showing a valid driver's license and one other item showing your address, such as a utility bill. Hours for using the dumpsters are weekdays, 7 AM – 3 PM. Saturday hours are printed in the community calendar -- this year on May 2 (we realize this newsletter is printed past this date) and October 17 between 9 AM and 3 PM. CURBSIDE BRUSH PICKUP

Weekly curbside brush pickup by City crews is available to residents from March through October. City crews check the entire City on Monday and Tuesday only each week, so please have brush to the curb by 6:30AM Monday. Brush consists of limbs and twigs. Please remember too that brush cannot be collected if mixed with other materials (such as leaves, grass, flowers, mulch, bush trimmings, wood fencing, nails, plastic, metal, lumber, etc). The machine used for this service is not designed to accept these materials as possible damage to the machine or bodily harm to City workers could occur with such items. Remember too that brush may also be placed with your normal trash pickup at any time for pickup by Rumpke. Brush must be no longer than six feet in length and tied in bundles or placed in containers for the Rumpke pickup. Residents are highly encouraged to use the Rumpke service throughout the year for small quantities of brush.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE REMINDERS

Blue Ash is a great place to live because, for the most part, Blue Ash residents take pride in their homes and neighborhoods. The City's property maintenance codes were created to promote the health, safety, and well-being of residents and neighborhoods through encouraging adherence to City codes. Compliance protects property values and neighborhoods against deteriorating influences. The City's property maintenance personnel regularly identify Code issues and respond to complaints regarding potential violations. Spring is a great time to assess your property, and we can make it easier! The City has developed a property

maintenance checklist to assist in evaluating the exterior condition of your property. The checklist can be found within the Community Development portion of BlueAsh.com (under the "municipal services" section, then click "planning-zoning-permits" of BlueAsh.com), can be picked up at the Community Development Office at City Hall, or can be mailed or faxed upon request by calling 745-8520. Together, we can make sure Blue Ash remains a desirable residential and business community for all to enjoy.

This part of the process assures the Census Master Address File is complete and accurate, confirming that Census forms are mailed to legitimate, existing addresses. The **Census is important** because the results help determine your representation in government, as well as how federal funds are spent in your community. Conducting the **Census** is a huge undertaking, and thousands of new employees are needed to complete the job. The **final phase** of the **Blue Ash/Hunt Road improvement project** began in early May. This phase affects **Hunt Road** and requires **complete closure** of Hunt between 8AM and 4PM on weekdays **between Conklin Avenue and the railroad tracks**. Motorists should be alert for detour information provided on message boards and signs. This phase of the project should be complete in early July, and is necessary to complete work associated with the installation of storm sewer, with final pavement restoration to follow. Updates will be posted to the City of Blue Ash website (road construction portion) at BlueAsh.com.

The City's **grounds maintenance staff** is staying abreast of the **Emerald Ash Borer (EAB)** situation in our area. **EAB has NOT been confirmed in Blue Ash**. At a recent conference featuring a speaker from Ohio State University, it was interesting to learn that **EAB** has been around longer than first suspected and it is the OSU expert's opinion that **EAB** may eventually reach all susceptible Ash trees (there are only a few resistant varieties). Keep an eye out on BlueAsh.com for new information as it develops.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK REMINDER

In mid May 2006, the City of Blue Ash implemented an emergency telephone notification service through a contracted company called CodeRed. The system, sometimes referred to as "reverse 9-1-1," is designed to rapidly call residences and businesses within the city via telephone with a recorded message, alerting them of matters of public safety such as crime alerts, missing persons, evacuation, shelter-in-place, etc.

Although initial data of residential addresses and telephone numbers was downloaded into the system by CodeRed, residents and businesses are encouraged to link to CodeRed where they can individually enter, or confirm, their information, which is kept strictly confidential. The opportunity to enter multiple telephone numbers is also possible, including cell numbers, etc.

While an initial download of residential phone numbers was made, it's important to note to our business community that such a download of business phone numbers is not available. So it's important for businesses to enter their phone information to be included within this notification service as well.

Please also note that it is NOT the intent to use this system to notify in the case of severe weather. Given the unpredictability and sudden nature of severe weather, residents will need to continue to rely on the Hamilton County sirens for immediate notification. Although the system will not be used to warn of weather emergencies, the system can be very useful in the aftermath should such a disaster affect any portion of Blue Ash. The system has already been used three times since its inception, including twice during the

September 2008 windstorm.

If a resident chooses not to be included in the database to receive these public safety messages, he/she may remove the telephone number(s) from the database by downloading, completing, and returning the Request for Removal from Database Form from the website (BlueAsh.com). Sorry ... no return faxes or E-mails of this form are accepted since original signatures are required.

A NOTE REGARDING PROPERTY TAXES...

Did you know that the collection of both residential and business property taxes is the responsibility of Hamilton County – not the City of Blue Ash? Since Blue Ash is sometimes contacted by citizens regarding their property tax bills, we thought this information might be interesting ...

Blue Ash is often asked for information about where their property tax monies go and just how much is used to provide local services within the City of Blue Ash. Real property taxes are based on the "assessed valuation" of your property – your property is assessed at 35% of market value. This market value is determined by the County through periodic reappraisal by the Hamilton County Auditor's Office. For example, if the actual or market value of your residential property is \$200,000, the assessed valuation is \$70,000 (35% of \$200,000). State law requires that all real property in a County must be reappraised every 6 years.

"Reappraisals" involve a County representative physically visiting the property to determine its value. Every 3 years, property is "reevaluated," and any adjustments to the values are made at that time (such as for inflation, etc.). Reappraisals were done in 2008.

The millage or tax rate applied to the assessed valuation is essentially determined by the voters in the district where the property is located. The semi-annual tax bill which property owners receive is forwarded by the Hamilton County Treasurer's Office and generally arrives in the year after the tax period being collected. For example, the tax bill that is due for payment in July of 2009 covers taxes due for the second half of 2008. Therefore, there may appear to be a delay in the impact of expiring levies or new millage approved by voters in the district.

Although the actual calculations determining the gross real estate tax, credits, rollbacks,

etc., can be somewhat complex, it is relatively simple to determine just where your tax dollars are going. For example, the right hand portion of your most recent tax bill contains a breakdown of funding to the various categories at the school, city, county, and special project areas.

A review of Blue Ash residential property tax bills due/paid in February 2009 (Sycamore School District) show that about 63% of your property taxes go to the Sycamore Schools. It is interesting to note that the City of Blue Ash portion of your gross millage is only 3.08 (as set by the City Charter), and represents at best revenue to the City of Blue Ash of approximately 6% of property owners' total gross real estate taxes paid.
